## Eight Years Driving A Taxi



Kenneth Burke was a 20<sup>th</sup> century American philosopher; he died in 1993. I have heard of Burke for 30 years. Speech professors at Northwestern first told me his theory, and he fascinated me. In preparing this piece, I learned something new. Harry Chapin was a very popular songwriter/singer who, in the early 1970s, recorded the great hit records "Taxi", "W-O-L-D" & "Cat's in the Cradle". Chapin died in a car accident in 1981. Kenneth Burke was

Chapin's grandfather. That explains a lot. Burke's primary interests were in rhetoric and aesthetics. In his philosophy, social interaction and communication should be understood in terms of a *pentad*, which includes AGENT, ACT, SCENE, PURPOSE and AGENCY. Journalists will recognize the pentad as a truncated version of the 5Ws & an H – WHO (agent)-WHAT (act)-WHEN/WHERE (scene)-WHY (purpose) -&-HOW (agency). Burke proposed that most social interaction and communication can be approached as a form of drama whose outcomes are determined by ratios between the five pentadic elements. Which W/H dominates? Which one is secondary? How do the two factors direct the communication? Burke's philosophy has become known as the "dramatistic pentad." The pentad is grounded in Burke's method which sees the relationship between life and theater as literal rather than metaphorical. For Burke, Shakespeare was not simply using a metaphor; all the world really *is* a stage. Burke pursued literary criticism not as a formalistic enterprise, but rather as an exercise with significant sociological impact. He saw literature as "equipment for living," offering folk-wisdom and common sense to people and thus guiding the way they lived their lives. I suppose you could propose that song lyrics, a form of literature, achieve the same status. "He'd grown up just like me; my boy was just like me."

Why do things change? Is it an ACT? a SCENE? an AGENT? an AGENCY? a PURPOSE? What ratio of the five changes our direction?

How many buildings have come down in the Holy Name Cathedral neighborhood since the beginning of 2002? I count these: the Ogden Public School; the CBS Studios on McClurg; the VA Hospital; the old offices of Ward Committeeman George Dunne next to Papa Milano's restaurant at State & Oak; the boutique/restaurant at Rush & Chestnut; the Dunkin' Donuts & the hot dog place on Chicago between State & Wabash; the 3-story residence & retail (used bookstore, White Hen, Dry Cleaner) at Chicago & Wabash; Michigan Avenue between Erie & Huron; the Sun-Times Building on Wabash at the River; the ominous 666 N. State address; the Marquette Center at Loyola. I'm sure there were more. What has been opened since '02? The Fordham; the Pinnacle; the Clare with the Loyola Speech School; the Bernardin; the Trump Tower; the Baumhart Loyola Residence Hall, & the Loyola University Museum of Art. What has changed? Quigley High School Seminary has become the Pastoral Center (Rush & Pearson); the Medinah Temple now is Bloomingdale's; the ground floor of Lewis Towers is the Hershey's Store, a convenience store, and Argo Tea; Carton's restaurant is the ING Café; Don Roth's is Jake's; a half-empty River East Building along with our 12-Pillar Chapel became the River East Art Center; Lord & Taylor is the American Girl Place; Buana Beef is Gino's East; the Fitzpatrick Hotel changed to Affinia; the old Pastoral Center/Chancery Office has become Administrative Offices for a coming neighbor – Children's Memorial Hospital; the House of Blues is the Sax; the dumpy Cass Hotel is the Holiday Inn Express; the north end of Grant Park has been renewed as Millennium Park; McDonald's on Ontario and at Chicago & State both have been knocked down and rebuilt.. Behind all that "progress" there was an agent, an act, an agency, a scene, and a purpose. In some cases, buildings outlived their usefulness; in others, there was a profit to be made; in others there was ego; in others the economy dictated the change; sometimes it was just the need to decide.

On January 7, 2002, I became pastor of Holy Name Cathedral. That was eight years ago next Thursday. I'd like to think that changes at Holy Name Cathedral since I arrived were primarily driven by me (the agent) and my motives (the purpose). Realistically, I know now that the scene drove the action in various and scattered directions. That is not to say that we had no vision. I think we did. Still, the structural repairs and the fire took us places I never expected to go. So did some mighty talented parishioners. Nevertheless, Holy Name Cathedral today is as beautiful a Catholic Church as there is in Chicago. We stand tall as the place where Chicago goes to pray.

Of what am I most proud as we mark the 8<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Holy Name Cathedral's drive with Father Dan Mayall at the wheel, its 9<sup>th</sup> pastor in 134 years? (1) Most of all, I am amazed that we have gotten punched in the gut two Februarys in a row (the falling ceiling piece of 2/08 that led to a 6-month closing of the Cathedral for structural repairs and the 2/4/09 fire that closed the Cathedral for another 6 months); nevertheless, we rose from the deck stronger than ever – with renewed might, with solid identity, with pride, with accessibility, with a new beauty. Does anyone doubt we are stronger and prettier today than when that infamous ceiling piece fell to the floor? (2) We are Chicago's Cathedral. No one questions that. We love our title, and we wear it well. When I will go next week to the American Cathedral Ministries Conference in Milwaukee, and when I say I am from Holy Name Cathedral, no one at all will have to ask where that famous Cathedral is. (3) The volunteer lay leadership of this parish is second to none. The Parish Pastoral Council, the Finance Council, the Commissions & all lay leaders set the direction and give Holy Name a face. (4) When Cardinal George is here, he is at home. That's not true in the relationship between every Cathedral and its bishop. It's true here. I am happy Cardinal George knows this is his home. (5) We have a financial vision for the last 4 ½ years of my term. When I ride on I want no parish debt, I want the rectory restoration and the courtyard remodeling finished, and I want the operating income of the parish to be in the black. I think that is all possible. (6) I am pleased about the volunteer opportunities available at Holy Name Cathedral – the Ministry of Care, the Thursday/Friday Suppers, all the Young Adult Ministry programs, and the ongoing work of all the Commissions and ministries. All of that really is Catholic work. (7) The Marriage Ministry at Holy Name Cathedral is great. We help 150 couples each year enter the lifelong Sacrament of Matrimony. I think we do our work well. I look forward to improving that ministry in 2010.

Am I happy to be the pastor of Holy Name Cathedral, of driving the taxi that calls itself Chicago's Church? Yes - unshakably, YES. Do you realize how good this parish is? If not, get involved. You'll see why I smile over eight evolving, challenging, blessed, rebounding, and solid years in the Holy Name of Jesus. "I took off for the sky."

The Feast of the Epiphany, this weekend's liturgical commemoration, identifies the Revelation of God even to those outside the Chosen, to the Magi (the Wise Men). Christ's presence is not our secret truth. We announce the one & only Jesus to you, too. People everywhere, come to Jesus. We will be happy to see you at Mass next Sunday and always. The January 1<sup>st</sup> Holy Day used to be called the Feast of the Circumcision; it also was the day Jesus received His Holy Name. The famous preacher Saint Bernardine of Siena placed great emphasis on the Holy Name which he associated with the IHS sign like the one on our ceiling. Today the Holy Name Feast is observed annually on January 3. The Holy Name of Jesus prayers get pre-empted this year by the Epiphany. Still, consider how much our parish does all year in the frame of the Holy Name of Jesus.

January 22<sup>nd</sup> marks the 37<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the legalization of abortion which has resulted in the death of nearly 52 million innocent, unborn babies in this country, one every 30 seconds. 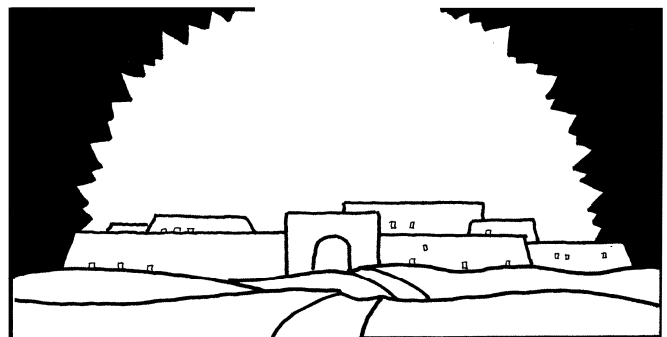

## Spirituality at Holy Name

### CATHEDRAL Music

**Epiphany Music** – Three mysteries mark this Feast Day of Epiphany in the Opening Hymn, *Songs of Thankfulness and Praise*, (WORSHIP 410) sung at all Masses this week end. In the first verse, the mystery of the Jesus' birth from the branch of royal David's stem, manifested by the star to the sages from afar. Then the appearance to the Magi is linked to those of the Baptism and the Wedding Feast at Cana which appears in the second verse of this timely hymn. The third mystery is reflected in this hymn's third verse with the view of salvation, in which we are both changed by God into his likeness, and also given to praise God with all our being.

The famous carol, *The First Noel* is also part of the festive music for this feast along with *What Child is This?* In addition to these great hymns, one of the organ preludes will include *Maurice Durufle: Prelude sur l'Introit de l'Epiphanie Op. 13* based on the Gregorian Chant melody for the Feast of the Epiphany.

**The Conference of Roman Catholic Cathedral Musicians** begins this week with the gathering of cathedral musicians from throughout the United States and Canada. The Conference of Roman Catholic Cathedral Musicians (CRCCM) is the collegial gathering of musicians serving cathedral churches in North America. It engages in dialogue, reflection, deliberation, resource exchange, mutual support, and ongoing professional development in consideration of the musico-liturgical practice in unique Cathedral settings as models for the Church-at-large.

CRCCM both seeks and stands ready to consult with other liturgical and musical organizations in the pursuit of beauty and excellence in worship, for the spiritual and cultural enrichment of the community and to the greater glory of God.

One of the founding members of CRCCM is former Director of Music for Holy Name Cathedral, Richard Proulx. He continues to be an advisor to the conference members.

This year's conference will be held at St. Mary's Cathedral, San Francisco, California.

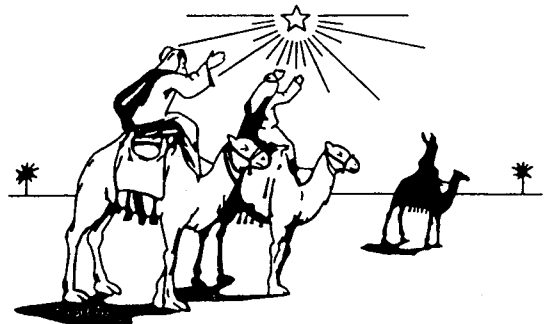
